LETTER TO OSM – stripped fynbos

In Fisherhaven on Riverside Drive there is a strip of Fynbos on Erf 775 that has been slashed, just beyond the Caravan/ Yacht club site. This is an area that Botfriends cleared of alien species more than a year ago, with a subsequent follow-up.

We have been investigating who might have slashed this Fynbos, including the Proteaceae species. We spoke to a number of the residents in Riverside who had observed people busy there. We have not been able to establish any clear reasons as to who might have been responsible. There was a team of municipal workers who had been doing some clearing in the Fisherhaven area at that time but we are reasonably sure it was not them. We should like some clarity as to whether the OSM has knowledge of this clearing.

It makes very little sense why such a large area was slashed, obviously not just for clearing the path to the view site. See attached photographs.

Botfriends would like to report this damage of the environment officially to the Environmental Department of the OSM, and ask that it be investigated further. We would be happy to assist. (Edited)

Finally, regarding indigenous/endemic animal movements, we have regular inspections from Cape Nature to ensure our fences are compliant. They have been specifically designed to make provision for the movement of all our local species to move through the fence without a problem.

Let the river run...

After very good rains, the Bot River estuary was artificially breached on 21 July by Cape Nature, with the result that it had emptied by the evening of 22 July, with a strong sea flow into the estuary at high tide.

There was an above average rainfall in June, followed by good rains in July. These filled the estuary to 2.9m above sea level. This still left 600-700mm to go before the estuary would breach naturally this year.

The estuary had been closed for 5 years and a well-compacted high bank of sand had built up. Only very high tides had flown over, which added very little water to the estuary. The estuary was still filling up by 100-140mm per day from fresh water. The previous week the estuary had filled more than a metre in six days. The more the estuary filled up, the stronger the flow became through Lamloch Swamps to the Kleinmond Estuary. The Kleinmond Estuary then breached naturally on 18 July 2020. The flow through to Kleinmond is a slow movement of water, over a long distance, through dense reeds, and only when the Bot Estuary is high. See our website **www.botfriends.org.za** for further info.
